

After the wind ... earthquake ... and fire there was the sound of silence. - 1 Kings 19:11-12

At the Crossroads

The Sound of Silence

When I was a child growing up outside New York City, I never knew what silence was. Every night, while trying to sleep, I was assaulted by the sounds of fire engines and police cars, people shouting, boom boxes on shoulders, even the occasional gun shot. Those were the sounds of city life. It wasn't until I went up to the mountains one summer and stared at the night sky that I experienced the deafening sound of silence. I must admit, it made me a bit uncomfortable.

In 1 Kings 18-19, Elijah confronts King Ahab and then defeats the false prophets on Mount Carmel. But Ahab refuses to repent and his wife, Jezebel, threatens to kill Elijah. So, he flees to Horeb, the mountain of God. Why? He is despondent, to the point of death, and is seeking some confirmation from God of what to do next. What better place to hear the voice of God than this place, where God spoke with fire and thunder? But when Elijah experiences the wind, earthquake, and fire, the Lord is not present in those manifestations. When he exits the cave in which he's hiding, what does Elijah hear? Jewish scholars translate what comes next as "the sound of silence". What does this silence "say" to Elijah? The answer you seek is not here! The Lord tells Elijah that this is not a time to run away, but to get back to business. And Elijah acts!


In Isaiah 53:7, the prophet writes about Jesus: "He was beaten, he was tortured, but he didn't say a word. Like a lamb taken to be slaughtered..., he took it all in silence." Jesus' "sound of silence" also speaks volumes. His commitment to remain silent led to his death, and his death makes it possible for us to respond to his offer of eternal life.

When God speaks to us through the "sound of silence", how do we respond? Does it make us uncomfortable? Does it provoke us to act? Or is God's attempt to speak to us through silence completely drowned out by the sounds of the world? -Andy

The Survey Says...


We want to thank our congregation for good participation in the Congregational Health Survey, which was administered in conjunction with the visit of Greg Anderson, the consultant from

Hope Network. The purpose of the survey was to assess the overall health of our congregation during this transition time. Gauging where our congregation is with respect to confidence in the leadership, un-



derstanding of our mission, overall satisfaction, motivation and enthusiasm, and receptiveness to change will help the leadership guide the congregation through the transition time and minister search. Our overall health score was at the high end of the average range (see Chart 1). At first glance this may not be impressive, but Greg told us that we are healthiest "church in transition" that he has worked with.

There were five categories that were assessed in the survey to make up the overall health score (see Chart 2). These categories were rated on a scale of 1 to 3. Overall, the results were generally positive and very encouraging. None of the scores were in a



range that would be considered "bad," however there was some level of dissatisfaction expressed. The shepherds want you to know that we hear you, and we will take a deeper look into those less than

positive responses as we go through this process. The results were generally the same across demographic categories (female vs. male for example), with some minor differences with age and length of time as a member.

- Average feedback on understanding of our mission statement was high (2.26).
- Average feedback on confidence in our leadership was very high (2.66). We thank you for your support and trust. We very much appreciate your confidence in us.
- The results, although still slightly positive, indicated a need for improvement in three areas: effectiveness in mission (1.95), the state of our enthusiasm/motivation (2.08), and receptiveness to change (1.98).

Again, be encouraged by our overall results. There is good news and indicators of potential growth contained in these scores. Your shepherds are committed to keeping you informed as we seek God's will during this time of transition, and as we begin the minister search process. We ask for you fervent and continued prayers for us, for our church body, and for those God is preparing to serve here in the future.
