

We're All A Mess

Self-Discipline as a Christian

I recently found this article written by John MacArthur entitled, "Learning Self-Discipline." If you would like to have the full version, it can easily be googled, or I would love to give you a copy. Be encouraged!

Self-discipline is important in any endeavor of life. It's best defined as the ability to regulate one's conduct by principle and sound judgment, rather than by impulse, desire, or social custom. Biblically, self-discipline may be summarized in one word: obedience. Here are some practical tips:

Start with small things: Clean your room at home or your desk at work. Train yourself to put things where they belong when they are out of place. Learning self-discipline in the little things of life prepares the way for big successes. In the words of Solomon, it is the little foxes that ruin the vineyards (Song of Solomon 2:15). Get yourself organized: Make a schedule, have a to-do list of things you need to accomplish. Don't constantly seek to be entertained: When you have free time, do things that are productive instead of merely entertaining. Be on time: If you're supposed to be somewhere at a specific time, be there on time (Ephesians 5:15-16). Keep your word: When you make commitments, see them through. That calls for the discipline to properly evaluate whether you have the time and capability to do something. Do the most difficult tasks first: Most spend their time doing the easier, low priority tasks. But when they run out of time (and energy), the difficult, high-priority tasks are left undone. Finish what you start: If you start something, finish it! Accept correction: Correction helps you develop self-discipline by showing you what you need to avoid (Proverbs 19:20 and Proverbs 15:31-32). Practice self-denial: Learn to say no to your feelings and impulses. Occasionally deny yourself pleasures that are perfectly legitimate for you to enjoy. Refraining from those things will remind your body who is in charge. Welcome responsibility: Volunteer to do things that need to be done. That will force you to have your life organized enough to have the time for such projects. Live every aspect of your life to the glory of God (1 Corinthians 10:31).

Update on Je'ani "Jee Jee" Lyles

Je'Ani "Jee Jee" Lyles, and her mother, Carla Ortiz, came to our church in early 2017. They were introduced to Derek and Leza Davis through a providential meeting with a police officer at a Wawa in Winslow Twp, who was also a former martial arts student of Derek's. Carla was looking for a way to connect to their new community, and this gentleman suggested she contact Derek at the West Atco Youth in Action Center. Je'Ani enrolled in Derek's program, and from there, the Davis' invited the family to attend activities, and eventually worship, at Pitman Road. Carla was baptized here one year ago, on June 11, 2017. If you haven't gotten to know them, they are quiet and kind.

On June 18, Carla and Jee Jee, 14 yrs. old, were traveling on I-95 in Maryland when they were stopped in construction traffic and hit from behind by a truck traveling at full speed. It was a multivehicle accident. Jee's spine was severed, and Carla received non life threating injuries. (Sadly, another 14 yr. old, Megan, in another car, lost her life.) On June 21, with friends and family around her, Carla shared with Jee that doctors at Johns Hopkins Medical Center believe she is permanently paralyzed from the waist down. She received that news in an amazingly positive way.

Jee is in the process of being moved into a rehab attached to Johns Hopkins in Baltimore. Carla has shared that Jee is "pushing through like a warrior" and is working hard to do everything that is being asked of her to build her strength for rehab.

Derek Davis shared the following, "Jee asked that we forgive the

truck driver for what he did because it is the right thing to do!" Wow, praise God for the spirit of this amazing young woman!

Here are some of the questions posed with abbreviated answers.

How do I get my grown child to come back to church?

- Don't make your kids an idol. Of course we want them back, but don't idolize them.
- Remember: God loves your children more than you do.
- Prayer, prayer, and more prayer. Pray without ceasing
- Model the right behavior. Be an example. Let them see your life as a sermon.
- Love unconditionally. Do not be judgmental.
- Remember we hold their hands for a while, but we hold their hearts forever.

What is the biggest obstacle in raising God-Centered Children?

- Social media. Read the book, Twelve Ways Your Phone is Changing You! by Tony Reinke.
- Technology.
- We lose connection with our kids. Stay connected.
- We (parents) lack honesty.

How can I be an encourager in the home when, in fact...I need to be encouraged?

- Go on a retreat, even a short one.
- Find a mentor, seek help/guidance (Gal. 6:10).
- Take a hike and give thanks. Pray.
- Be transparent.
- Satan likes to isolate us. Temptation is common to all
- Don't ever quit! "I am with you always," said Jesus.
- Worship music encourages me.
- Don't rely on other people for our joy. Scriptures can give great comfort.
- It is not a sin to be discouraged.

How can we stay optimistic about living for God and giving our homes to God in a world filled with negativity?

- There are 70 verses in scripture related to optimism.
- Turn off TV, phones and computer.
- Remember that Jesus said, "There will be trouble."
- Don't look to pop culture.
- Remember that there have always been negatives, we just hear more about the negatives today.
- Negativity is an opportunity for us to grow.
- Seek out "like-minded" people.
- Remember which kingdom we belong to.
- Whatever is true, honorable, commendable, pure, just, lovely, think on these (Phil. 4:8).

What are some ways to build relationships with our kids when they are small, so that we can connect with them as adults?

- Spend time with them when they are small (lots of time).
- Make certain they realize they are a priority.
- Keep them involved in positive things.
- Welcome their friends into your home.
- Intentionally involve your kids in adult activities (like letting them work with you).
