#### THE POWER BEHIND CHRISTMAS

I have been reading through 2 Kings as part of my Year of Discipleship with Josiah (if you want to know more about what that is, ask one of us). Josiah chose it as our Bible book to study together. 2 Kings is filled with stories of God's power through Elisha, sad stories of Israel's kings, and hopeful stories of Judean kings, such as Hezekiah and Josiah. This passage stood out to me one day:

But these various groups of foreigners also continued to worship their own gods. In town after town where they lived, they placed their idols at the pagan shrines that the people of Samaria had built. Those from Babylon worshiped idols of their god Succoth-benoth. Those from Cuthah worshiped their god Nergal. And those from Hamath worshiped Ashima. The Avvites worshiped their gods Nibhaz and Tartak. And the people from Sepharvaim even burned their own children as sacrifices to their gods Adrammelech and Anammelech.

This is after Israel has been conquered by the Assyrians during King Hoshea's reign. The Assyrians move people into Samaria and are taught about Israel's God, but still worshipped these minor deities. What struck me were the variety of gods. How many idols did these people bring with them? How many different allegiances did they have? How much fear ruled their lives? What would drive someone to burn their own children as the people of Sepharvaim did? Worshipping all these other gods was not new to Israel. In fact, the author writes earlier in the chapter, "this disaster (Assyria conquering Israel) came upon the people of Israel because they worshiped other gods." People had traded the true power of God for the powerless idols of false gods. Thus, disaster ensued. This brings me to the power behind Christmas.

The angels sang out in chorus on the night of Jesus' birth. They witnessed, through song, to shepherds in the fields, a new power coming from Heaven to Earth. The King of Heaven would bring joy and peace. The night of Jesus' birth was and is a night of celebration, but not even the angels knew the ultimate and mysterious plan of God (Eph 3:9). The plan included Christ's death on the cross. What started on the glorious morning of God becoming flesh as a newborn baby, ended in the most shameful death imaginable. Yet, what Jesus did on the cross affected more than just humanity. Paul writes to the Colossians, "He stripped all the spiritual tyrants in the universe of their sham authority at the Cross and marched them naked through the streets" (2:15, Msg).

What Paul's words mean is the power the Israelites and Babylonians handed to the minor deities listed in 2 Kings 17 has been taken back by Jesus. What we see happening to him on this side of the veil is reversed in the spiritual realm. Instead of him marching naked through the streets to Golgotha, it is the false gods who march naked. We give power to all sorts of idols in our day. They don't have names like Tartak or Nergal. They have names like money, possessions, sex, food, sports. We give power to them by giving away our time and sacrificing our families for them. Jesus came to strip powers from spiritual tyrants, and we give it back. One of my favorite Christmas songs is Hark! The Herald Angels Sing (listen to the Pentatonix version). There is some great theology within the lyrics of this song. The first verse goes like this:

Peace on earth and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled Joyful all ye nations rise; join the triumph of the skies

The celebration of Christmas is the celebration of what God is willing to do to reconcile with his people, who have given allegiance to other gods. He entered our realm as a vulnerable baby, endured the scorn of men, and died a death on the cross. Jesus triumphed over all gods to who we give power. This Christmas, as we remember and celebrate God Incarnate, let's remember the power behind Christmas is the power of Jesus on the Cross.

items and toys that will put a big smile on a child's face.


